yet rarely are they seen.

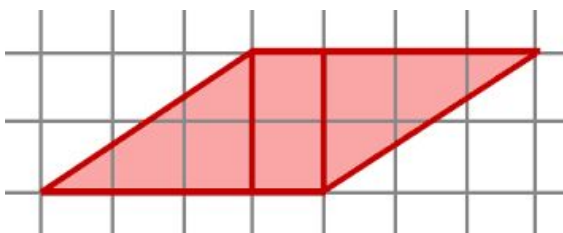
Most bats have a special gift-

that can really fly!

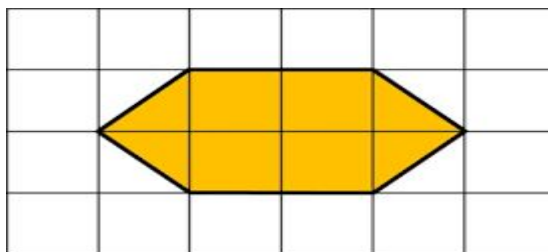
